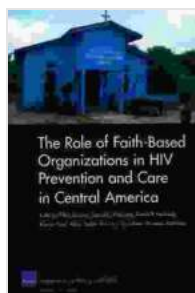


The Role of Faith-Based Organizations in HIV Prevention and Care in Central Africa: Advancing Health and Hope

The Role of FBOs in Promoting Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment

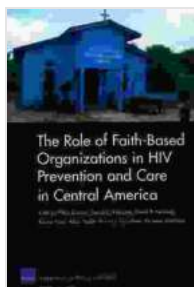
